#### **Easter Reflection**

"Lord, now you are letting your servant depart in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation that you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel." Luke 2:29-32

Easter Monday 21st April 2025, saw the departure of God's humble servant His Holiness Pope Francis from the bustle and turmoil of this mortal life. Luke 2:29-32 sees Simeon ready to depart in peace and his words have become the canticle the Nunc Dimittis. Perhaps, not unlike Simeon, Pope Francis was also ready to depart in peace. If so, it is wonderfully fitting that it should be once his most sacred duty had been fulfilled, overlooking St Peter's Square, blessing the 35,000 people gathered to celebrate Easter at the Vatican. It gives all believers great spiritual encouragement to see our world united to mourn the loss of such a good and godly man, and in doing so witness to the power of the love of Christ to unite us, brothers and sisters across the globe with the God of our Easter faith. Recalling his contribution to Christian witness, Rt Rev Dr Shaw Paterson, Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland renewed the call made by His Holiness in *Laudato* si' to care for the earth as our common home and in *Fratelli tutti* to discover the presence of Christ in each human being. The Moderator encouraged all of us within our Christian family to join in the prayer of Pope Francis:

Grant that we Christians may live the Gospel, discovering Christ in each human being, recognizing him crucified in the sufferings of the abandoned and forgotten of our world and risen in each brother or sister who makes a new start.

Amen.

It is with great affection we bid farewell to Pope Francis, who amongst his many other commitments and achievements, found time, every day throughout the Israel-Hamas war, to video call the children of the Church of the Holy Family in Gaza. Lord, in thy mercy, grant him a safe lodging, a holy rest, and peace at the last.

# Did You Attend Church That Day....?

The question is simple. Did you attend church on May the 8th 2005. That was twenty years ago so perhaps you cannot actually remember that very day. . . . but let me jog your memory.

Twenty years ago on the 8th May 2005 the church held a special service called the 1000 service.

The whole idea of the service was to fill the church with as many people as possible so the congregation would be around 1000 people.

A special committee was formed to organise the service and the minister, the Rev Ian Petrie, and the Session Clerk, Ian Clarke, gave their full support.

Invitations were sent to the Nine and the Three Trades as well as all of the hall lets and all of the bowling clubs from other churches who visited our church for bowling evenings.

Members of the church were encouraged to bring relations and friends, all with the intention of filling the church. Elders were stationed upstairs and downstairs and all round the church to guide people to their seats and others were on duty on the terrace to make sure that everyone was made very welcome.

A special hymn sheet was produced with popular hymns and an outside caterer was hired so that everyone could enjoy a coffee or tea at the close of the service.

The open plate was, for this special service, to be donated to Christian Aid.

Unfortunately the magic figure of 1000 was not quite reached but around 750 to 800 happy people, all singing their hearts out, enjoyed themselves.

Perhaps you were one of the lucky people who attended that service when the church was nearly full and the singing was something so very special with the atmosphere being electric.

## Guild News



Our session finished with a Daffodil Tea which, although not well-attended, raised over £240 for Guild funds. Every year our Guild donates to various groups, as well as supporting the Guild projects and our church. The proceeds from the Daffodil Tea will go towards next session's donations.

On 30<sup>th</sup> April, we hosted a Mini-Gathering for Guilds throughout Dundee and Angus. We also had an update on the work of the Guild nationally from Karen Gillon, the General Secretary. Karen also shared some resources to help with conducting devotions and ideas for future programme planning.

And I sunned it with smiles, And with soft deceitful wiles.



# Reflections of Activities of the St Andrew's Parish Church Boys' Brigade and Former Members' Association

#### A Follow-up to the BB and the Drummond Hall Days

Friday night at the end of the week's camping there was always the pie and peas supper - the buster - with pies supplied by our officer - Jack Tellfer - who was a Master Baker with Goodfellows. Then followed a "Dundee's Got Talent" with entertainers from the officers and ranks on stage to either sing, play an instrument, or tell a few jokes. Gordon Law on the fiddle - violin - was one of the star turns along with Willie Doctor on the accordion and Willie Edwards supplying an endless joke book. The finale to the evening was an A to Z summing up the week's camp and all the characters who warranted a mention in a hilarious poem all compiled during the week by the officers and NCO's or non-commissioned officers. At the end of each verse we all joined in the chorus:

Tra La La, Tra La Lee, what a wonderful crowd is St Andrew's BB.

How many hundreds of "laddies" passed through the BB Company over the years from 1891 to 2010 or thereabouts as the last entry in the FMA Record Book was a tribute to Gordon Davidson, a regular Church Member, a "Braw Piper" in the BB Pipeband, and who carried for years the pain and discomfort of an accident at sea. Sadly, like the number of ex-BB members, the memories begin to fade but not before I mention just a few of the Officers who gave us so much of their time to "Quit Ye Like Men. Be Strong".

To Chaplain T.R.S. Campbell, Captain John Fridge, Church Officer George Ormond, Officers Bob Adams, Dave Pont, Mac Mackenzie, Jack Telfer, Chic Smith, Aubrey Evans, Harry Watson, and many more over the years. These men carried on a great tradition and the "boys" thank you for comradeship and true friendship, and remember the BB Camp Chorus:

Lee, What A Wonderful Crowd WAS St Andrew's BB.

# Reflections of the Wormit Rail Crash - 28th May 1995

On the 28th May 1955 St Andrews Church Sunday school along with 2 other Sunday schools were returning from a picnic at Tayport when we were involved in a terrible train crash at Wormit Station, which sadly three lives were lost. My mother Marion Adams and my brother Bobby and I were in the first carriage in the tunnel which was still upright. We managed to climb down and walked towards the platform which we were helped up onto.

It was total carnage with carriages all piled up. People were clambering up the embankment on the opposite side to reach the road. Tennis players from nearby courts scrambled over fences to help with the injured. People were trapped as the seating came away from the walls of the carriage and many had bad leg injuries. We started walking with many others who were able and headed towards the Fifie to take us back to Dundee. 70 years on that image has never left me.


